<p><b>CDBG Residential Public Infrastructure Grant (RPIG) (formerly CDBG Water &amp; Sewer Grant)</b></p>	<p>Open cycle starts June until funds are expended</p>	<p>Application window opened and continues until all funds committed. <p><b>Harmful Algal Blooms (HAB) Improvements</b></p>	<p>Fiscal Year</p>	<p>Funding for Water and Wastewater Improvements to address HAB is available for laboratory equipment (grant up to \$30,000) and low interest loans through existing programs. <p><b>Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC)</b></p>	<p>Pre-Applications Due in March-April</p>	<p>Funding for projects in the Appalachian Region in program areas: Community Infrastructure, Education and Training, Health; Transportation and Highways; Distressed Counties Asset-based Development; Tourism Development; Export and Trade Development, Entrepreneurship and Business Development, Energy, and Leadership Development and Capacity Building</p> <p>Eligible applicants include political subdivisions, education, public institutions (port authorities, libraries) and non-profit organizations. Funds are administered by four local development districts. Application process starts in January-February with County Caucus Meetings. <p><b>Water Infrastructure Finance And Innovation Act (WIFIA)</b></p>	<p>August through September, dependent on funding availability</p>	<p>Long-term, low cost supplemental loans for regionally and nationally significant projects. Minimum project size \$20 million, \$5 million minimum project size for small communities (&lt;25,000 population). Program can loan 49% maximum portion of eligible project costs. 35 years maximum final maturity date, interest rate equal to or greater to the us treasury rate. Repayment may be deferred maximum 5 years from substantial completion. Projects must be creditworthy.</p> <p>Eligible projects include wastewater collection and treatment, water treatment and distribution, enhanced energy efficiency projects, aquifer recharge and water recycling, and combination of eligible projects.</p>
